A New Fund is Helping More Local Kids Participate in Sports

A Gift for Local Children

While playing sports is a staple in many childhoods, it's not necessarily something that all children have access to. A gift from one local man's estate is making sure more local kids get that opportunity.

The estate of Mike Brimlow set up an endowment with the Kearney Area Community Foundation (KACF) to help cover costs for local kids wanting to participate in sports through the Kearney Park and Recreation Department. Brimlow's gift will be used to help cover both registration fees and the cost of equipment.

"He loved sports," says Steve Voigt, Brimlow's friend and attorney. "He wanted kids that had needs to be able to have the same type of new glove, the new baseball cleats that everybody else had. This was his way of trying to make those kids that had a greater need feel better about participating in sports, and maybe be excited about it."

Brimlow's desire to help those in need may have come from his own experiences.

"His parents didn't have a lot," Voigt says. "When he was a kid, he didn't always have new equipment. I think that sparked his interest in kids that have a greater level of need."

Lexington High School 1969

After graduating from Lexington High School, Brimlow spent some time in the Army, before coming to Kearney to attend college. He played football at Kearney State College as an offensive lineman from 1973-1976 and lettered all four years. "He was a big guy, as you might expect with an offensive lineman," Voigt laughs, "but he was always happy and smiling; greeted everyone with a smile. He just genuinely liked people, especially kids. He'd always go out of his way to play catch with any kid that was around." After graduating college, Brimlow stayed a Kearney resident, working for Eaton Corporation.

During his time at Eaton, Brimlow saved a lot of his money, allowing him to grow his wealth. "He never spent a whole lot," Voigt says. "Pretty simple means, you know. He had a 10-year-old pickup. So he just saved it all. He spent a lifetime saving."

Brimlow's love of sports was evident throughout his life, and was something Voigt was able to see first-hand both as a friend and a teammate. "We spent a lot of time in softball tournaments. We played a lot of games, probably 60 games over the summer. It wasn't unusual to play 7 or 8 games over a weekend." It wasn't just softball that Brimlow enjoyed. While in the Army, he won a national sharpshooter's award and loved to target shoot throughout his retirement. He also liked hunting and fishing.

While this part of Brimlow's gift will focus on helping children, it stems from his overall love of people. 75% of his estate went to charities serving those in need in the Kearney community. "He'd always find somebody to talk to; make a new friend," Voigt says. "It's just kind of what he was like."
